'Health' literally means a state of well-being. 'Sickness' on the other hand pertains to a state of discomfort. Today, when rat- race reign supreme and throw away culture rules, an individual is no longer contented with what he/she already have. Instead of being satisfied with that, an individual can always be seen running after a new goal. Instead of valuing ~~its~~ current

'health', it is being taken for granted. This status quo works under face with a 'sickness' which forces a person to realise what is really important for him/her. As society is made up of these individuals, the same holds true for it also.

Let us consider this from a historical perspective. India has such a ~~long~~ history dating back to 1000s of years. From the citadels of Lothal and Dholavira of Harappan civilisation to fossil remains of dinosaurs found in Nagpur, the entire country is dotted with numerous archaeological sites and antiques.

Yet, inspite of these, our country has acute lack of historical consciousness. History is forgotten and left only for scholars to study. But when calamity strikes, history is suddenly remembered. It was first time many people came to know about the Natural

History Museum in Delhi after the recent fire incident. Similarly when ~~old~~ antiques like Natraja idols were returned from abroad, there was sudden spike of interest in their historical importance. Thus it is clear that history is forgotten till a event or incident happens generating momentary interest.

The same can be seen from a societal perspective too. If America is considered melting pot, India resembles a 'thali' with multitude of faiths and beliefs. It has long tradition of a syncretic culture which rest on the pillars of tolerance, acceptance and the principle of 'live and let live'. 'Saavajan sukhai', 'saavjan hitai' is the core mantra of this society.

All of these societal values and principles are taken for granted until social tensions are taken for granted. religious riots as social crisis. It is only in face of ~~as being~~ witnessed after the repeated beating of Dalits (Una incident) that we suddenly remembers these values.

The same mindset boils down in political sphere ~~as well~~ when India became independent, numerous statesmen and scholars predicted the demise of the country in its then form in few years. In spite of such pessimism, our founding fathers gave us a constitution which can be considered landmark in all senses. From granting fundamental rights to universal adult suffrage, from espousing the ideals of social, economic and political justice, they laid the ~~best~~ foundation of a vibrant democracy.

This foresightfulness in drafting the constitution and its intrinsic value is often forgotten until a political crisis strikes for instance, it was in the face of emergency that our country realised the true importance of democracy.

This habit of not valuing what we already have can be seen in work in economic

~~arena too~~: In the last few years, under the pragmatic supervision of Dr. Rajan, RBI steadily build up its foreign exchange reserves. Instead of being lauded for it, many actually criticised them for such policy.

However, this pragmatism was proved potent when markets were hit with volatility. It was in face of a difficult situation that the importance of such reserves were realised by many economist.

This same story repeats in numerous other sphere of modern life. India has one of the most diverse and such animal population in the world with highest numbers of tigers as per recent census however till.

~~a few years ago~~, there was complete absence of interest from public until it was realised that their population has decreased drastically in the popular Ranthambore and Sariska reserves.

At personal level too, a modern individual takes it health for granted. The culture of 'fast food' and 'cold drinks' is a sad reflection for this. Thus consumption is accompanied by a complete disregard for what is good for bodily function. This lifestyle, however becomes a root cause of many lifestyle diseases like obesity, diabetes etc. It is only in the face of such diseases that a person realise the true value of health. Many times, it is seen that this disregard for health is due to ignorance of the implication of modern lifestyle or due to lack of awareness/education about importance of health. The same might hold true for other societal spheres too.

Thus there is an immediate need to develop appreciation of history for ~~developing~~ fostering historical consciousness, broad economic perspective for prudent economic policies.

A. India's first PM Jawahar Lal Nehru used to keep famous lines of the "Road Not Taken" poem by Robert Frost whose essence was that "the decision to not take a road made all the difference." Numerous examples from history, economy, polity and even from lives of great leaders shows that opportunity is what you make out of it. Those who are brave and courageous enough to take it up enjoys the fruits of success.

Success is defined as the feeling of getting what you want. It is synonymous to achieving your goal. Opportunity on the other hand refers to an event or happening which can be utilised by an individual to bring a positive change for himself / herself. Every opportunity presents itself with a choice -

to take it or not take it. There is also an inherent risk associated with it in the sense that there is no guarantee of success and fulfilment of goal if opportunity is taken up.

Thus a lot of people shy away from taking opportunity. It is only those with courage, fortitude and conviction in one's ability that are able to utilise these opportunity for climbing the ladders of success.

The same also holds true for countries, businesses, organisations, political parties and other entities made of group of people.

If we consider World History, the example of ~~non-existent~~ emergence of USA as a global superpower stands out. Till the end of 19th century USA used to follow an isolationist foreign policy. Even after significant contribution in World War - I

it stepped back from international arena in early decades of 20th century. However it soon realised that there was an opportunity for it to expand its influence in Europe as the entire continent was war-torn and reeling under depression. It also saw a scope to expand the market for its goods in European countries. Thus it significantly amplified its involvement in European affairs and later became a decisive force in World War -2. At the end of the war, along with USSR, it emerged as another pole of the Bipolar world. It is clear that this was the result of pragmatic use of opportunities presented to the country.

In the same vein if we see economic history, the rise of China as economic superpower is built upon successful spotting and utilisation of opportunities. Deng Xiaoping said in 1970, "Each country is faced with a time in its history when it can make a choice as

decision to use an opportunity which can make a difference to lives of millions of its citizens'

China, although a communist country was quick to spot openings in global market in the face of 1970s fuel crisis and changed its entire economic model in few decades. As a result of it, today it is in the same league as USA as far as economic influence is concerned.

Closer home, the political history of our country tells the same story. During freedom struggle, Congress utilised each and every opportunity to embarrass britishers, forcing them to react or give concession and in the process consolidate the idea of India as single nation. The end result today is a vibrant democracy with unimaginable diversity. That the ladder of success is best climbed by stepping on the rungs of opportunity.

is also clear from the achievements of ISRO. It faced non-cooperation from reputed agencies like NASA in its early days. But it turned the situation into its advantage by developing domestic launch capabilities. This ability to strike opportunities became a hallmark of its success.

Very much related to ISRO is the life-story of late President Dr Kalam. Initially he was just another engineer working at ISRO. But he quickly took up opportunity given by Dr. Vikram Sarabhai and became Project leader for SLV project. Subsequently his ability to take up difficult responsibilities saw him succeed at DRDO and in India's nuclear programme. His life-history is a classic example of how sky is the limit for someone who dares to dream and use the opportunities given to turn those dreams into realities.


Rome wasn't built in a day goes the old saying. Success is the result of not just




