Section - A

Charity → Humility helps one realize misfortune can strike anyone even oneself, and hence promotes a conscience of giving back to society.

Obedience → Humility brings self-awareness on our limitations, and recognises the value in obeying our superiors & elders.

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2. Why is there a conflict between religion and rationality? Which of them is a better guide for the promotion of morality in society? Is being rational also being just and fair?
 (150 Words) (10 Marks)

Contemporary thinking is that religion and rationality are contradictory.
Religion is a metaphysical belief which helps guide a moral life. It involves a matter of faith and fear of divine sanction or promise of reward.

Rationality dictates choice based on reason and objectivity.

It is hard to blindly believe in ~~any~~ religious tenets or specifically since much of it cannot be scientifically proven.

Better Guide :

→ Rationality is a better choice in public service because it leads to consistent and justifiable solution.
 It is also secular and has

like India.

→ But Religion is misinterpreted
as superstition and miracles. Its
philosophical code promoting all round
and social values are ignored.
Hence the spirituality of
religion must temper the bluntness
of rationality.

Is rational just & fair?

→ In day to day administration,
rationality often promotes justice
and fairness because it emphasizes
on justifiability, promising
accountability.

But sometimes, justice and
fairness requires going beyond
it. Example, affirmative action
is against the rationality of
competition, merit and efficiency.
But it is fair and just.

3. Mob violence, also referred to as "Mob Justice" highlights a striking paradox - it approves the dispensation of justice by people, who usurp the authority of constitutional bodies and apply a process they define as speedy. Answer the following questions related to it:
- Do you see the principles of justice being followed in the 'Mob Justice'?
 - How is it interrelated with the attitude of society?
 - Analyze why the incidences of Mob Justice have increased in recent days.
- (250 Words) (20 Marks)

Mob violence has increased in the recent years, with more than 100 cases registered in last 4 years. Many innocent victims like Pehlu Khan, Dadri victim etc have lost their lives.

a) Principles of justice in Mob justice

- It is based on 'retaliatory justice'. For example, mobs lynch child abductor or rapists.
- It aims to give 'proportional justice' to their crimes. For example, eating beef is sacrilege and hence deserves ~~no~~ punishment.
- 'Instant justice' where courts delay or police inefficiency is not affected.

Remarks

→ 'Democratic justice' where the people themselves judge the crimes and punishments like in ancient times

However, it is clearly a flawed sense of justice because

→ 'Speedy justice' ignores basic channels of defence for the victims.
It ignores possibility of error.

It was clearly demonstrated in cases of misinformation on social media leading to lynchings.

→ 'Retaliation' is no longer considered a valid reason in modern society.

→ Proportionality is disapproved because the law of land, constitution safeguards, values, etc are ignored.

b) ATTITUDE OF SOCIETY:

→ Lack of respect/trust in rule of law → cognitive factor

Remarks

→ It reflects maturity of society

GS SCORE

- (1) → Behavioural factor - People now seem to believe their right not to get offended is more valuable than right to life & liberty of others.
- Affective factor ⇒ Mobs have low emotional maturity and lack of action by police encourages it.

[Why incidents have increased]

- Misinformation campaigns on social media
- No deterrence because the law enforcement is ineffective.
- Huge delays in courts leading to lack of faith.
- Poor leadership, with some party leaders encouraging it.

(2) These need resolute efforts, based on awareness generation and deterrent law enforcement.

How will you comment on his performance? What precautions are needed while criticizing the work performance of subordinates? (150 Words) (10 Marks)

As the head of a disaster management team, effective delivery of essentials takes prime importance.

COMMENT ON PERFORMANCE:

Here, the subordinate was not able to handle the assigned task properly. This shows:

Personal failures of the subordinate

→ Competence inadequacy

→ Poor collaboration. In case of failure he/she should have asked for help/support

→ Failed the trust of superior

→ Failed in an emergency faced by society, showing low emotional intelligence.

2) Organisational failure

- As the head, I should have been

able to assess the abilities of junior & in case it was inadequate, I should have arranged capacity building.

→ I should have ensured a backup solution in such critical moments.

Therefore a balanced approach as required while criticising.

Precautions

→ Analyse the events, and find out where the failure occurred. It could be because of supply chain wrong prioritisation, or irresponsible behaviour, etc.

→ Criticise the officer for his individual failures with a view to ① Improve future performance
② Deter incompetence.

→ Later make sure sincere efforts are appreciated, so as to prevent demoralization, which would be a loss to organisation as a whole.

Instead Divorce is a disease plaguing contemporary society due to several factors like urbanisation, breakdown of joint family system, increased awareness of rights among women etc.

However, it leads to:

- 1) Uncertain future for children

a) **Values** are defined as a concept of the desirable, with a motivating force. It is a quality or which is considered valuable by the individual and society. eg: Honesty is a value.

Belief is a subjective thought which an individual is convinced in.

eg: Raju believes honesty is the best policy.

However the difference is that belief is no guarantee of a value while ~~value~~ 'value' is.

eg: Jimmy believes honesty is irrational.

b) **Honesty** refers to the quality of being truthful. It is a consistent commitment to not lie.

Remarks

Truth is upheld in honesty

[Loyalty] refers to a commitment to a cause, individual or organisation.

e.g. IAS officers are expected to be loyal to government;

Loyalty mostly involves honesty, but not necessarily. For example, whistleblowers are considered disloyal for breaking secrecy laws but are honest. This is due to a conflict in definition of loyalty, which can be to the family, society or a company.

9. Your sister recently had twins and wants to raise them to have a tolerant and accepting attitudes towards people from different backgrounds. What advice would you give to her? (150 Words) (10 Marks)

Tolerance involves in accepting ideas which may be contradictory to our own. It is essential component of attitude to whole living in a democracy. Good

13. The general elections are in progress and you have been appointed as a sector magistrate to oversee the free, fair, and peaceful conduct of elections in a sector which has 10 polling stations. In course of your tour, you notice a powerful minister moving to various polling stations with lethal weapons. He is accompanied with anti-social elements. The people moving with the minister are intimidating the voters of Scheduled Caste to not go to polling stations to vote. One of the supporters of the minister warns you on your mobile phone that it would be better if you do not interfere and avoid a confrontation with the minister.

What will you do in such a situation? Some of the options are given below. Evaluate the merits and demerits of these options and finally suggest what course of action you would take giving reasons.

- Arrest the minister along with his supporters and seize his arms, ammunition and vehicles, and immediately file a criminal case in the local police station.
- Inform the election control room and seek police reinforcement with instructions regarding what to do.
- Go to the villages inhabited by members of the Scheduled Caste and help them to cast their votes by arranging vehicles.
- Inform the election observer and other senior authorities and seek their help and guidance. Till then, try to avoid a confrontation with the minister.
- Ignore the minister and his supporters with the hope that they might get caught if they created any disturbance in the polling stations, as every polling station has a static arm picket has been stationed.

(250 Words) (20 Marks)

As the sector magistrate, it is my duty to ensure free and fair elections. It is an absolute necessity in a democracy, and criminalisation is a bane which affects not merely politics, but also economy and the very attitudes of the society itself. Therefore, it is clear that it has to be combatted.

People consider that they have rights to better public utilities and public spaces solely on the basis of government's ability to provide them.
- What are major possible options in this regard? Identify limitations of each competing options.
 - What should be an ideal way to manage the quality of public utilities and public spaces in a populous country like India? (250 Words) (20 Marks)

Effective delivery of public utilities is one of the primary duties of the government and a justification for taxation. However, the libertarian rights based attitude of people seems to forget that rights are a reward for the performance of duties.

a) [OPTIONS]

To get it succeeded among people first
To introduce laws mandating duty of public to keep public spaces clean.
Introduce fines for littering, spilling etc.

Limitations:

- Coercive mechanism
- No guaranteed attitude change
- Poor implementation. Fines for spilling have been in existence for a long time but poorly enforced.

Remarks

- 2) Awareness programmes to generate a sense of civic responsibility
 → Engage media, social media celebrities and politician
 → leverage schemes like Swachh Bharat & Sundar Bharat.

Limitations:

- No compulsion: In India, voluntary respect for law is low, as seen in flagrant violation of traffic laws.
- No accountability & enforceability among administrators

- 3) Increase taxes and user charges
 → use it to provide better service

It limits:

- Not a sustainable solution
- Taxes create discontent & politicians to be may not be inclined
- ^{Anti-social} citizens will continue to abuse the systems, mandalas, boards etc.

b) IDEAL WAY

Since the social and administrative situation of India is highly complex the solutions must be multi faceted

1) Awareness creation

- Ensuring people know their duties
- Loss of public space is a loss for all.
- Understand it is their own tax money which is used.
- Create a sense of ownership

2) Capacity building for better service delivery

- Outsourcing maintenance to private groups for efficiency and cost effectiveness

3) Legal measures & enforcement to deter the anti social elements

4) Rationalise user charges of public utilities

- What are the options before you to deal with this crisis?
- Evaluate the merits/demerits of each option and suggest the best course of action. Give reasons.

(250 Words) (20 Marks)

Disasters like floods cause untold suffering, along with loss of life and livelihood. Public servants' effectiveness is expected in such moments.

As the head of disaster control team, I have several options:

[OPTIONS]:

- Accept the suspension of official and continue with other workers
- Oppose the suspension since it is on selfish interest, and threaten resignation.
- Resign from post to show opposition
- Consider a balanced option, with priority being effective containment of disaster

b) **EVALUATION :**

① Accept the suspension & continue

Merit

- Prioritizes the disaster
- Prevents personal conflict with politician

Demerit

- Unjust to suspended officials
- Denies their service to flood victims
- Demoralization can hamper work of team

- Must rally the team to ensure delivery of services & disaster containment. Guarantee action to defend the officials.
- At the same time, send a report on the necessity of the suspended official in management & how their expertise is invaluable.
- Engage the local politician who can use their influence & manpower to help with disaster relief.

One day an old man approaches you and complain that an Assistant in charge of Old Age Pension Scheme is demanding Rs. 100 from him for clearing his pension claims. He has further revealed that this is a common practice in this office and those who do not pay the bribe, are harassed. You get upset with the state of affairs and want to solve the problem of the old man along with bringing some qualitative change in the work culture of the organization, for better service delivery.

- What are the options available to you?
- Evaluate each of these options and choose the option which you would adopt, giving reasons. (250 Words) (20 Marks)

A work culture where integrity, honesty and efficiency are promoted is invaluable for public service.

Here, as the head of the organisation, it is my duty to ensure bribery & other immoral practices are eliminated.

a) OPTIONS

- ~~Conduct a study to understand the depth of the problem. Submit report to seniors.~~
- ~~Punish the Assistant to set an example.~~
- ~~Conduct awareness campaign to exhort ethical behaviour.~~
- ~~Bring systemic reforms setting up complaint boxes, audits, etc.~~

Remarks

b) EVALUATION :

① Conduct a study; submit report

Merits:

- Permits effective long term solution
- Understand how pervasive the issue
- Good basis for systemic reform.

Demerits:

- Uncertain outcomes. Report can be ignored.
- Time consuming, while bribery & harassment continues.

② Deterrence: Punish the Assistant & all others found

Merits:

- legal & accountability measures are effective to restrict worst forms of behaviour → Precedent is set.

Demerits:

- Can face false charges, employee discontent etc.
- Can face illegality can just become more subtle & undetectable.
- Behavioural & attitudinal changes uncertain.

17. You are a Superintendent of Police and a huge protest is going on in front of your office. These protesters are Human Right activists. The protest is because of two consecutive incidents that happened in your district.

Case one: The city SP has received intelligence that bombs have been planted in various places in the city. The SP asked his team to conduct a massive search operation. After putting in strenuous hard work, the police team raided a house where two people with 2 kg of explosives and IED devices were found. The Police team immediately arrested them and brought them to the police station. Police started interrogating them about the whereabouts of the bombs and their plans. When they failed to get any information from them, one of the Police Officers adopted third degree Torture, in case of new criminals, often works. But one of them died during the process, as he failed to bear the pain of torture. Death in police custody became a big issue.

Case two: Recently communal riots occurred in your area and a few police constables got surrounded by a group, viewing the grave situation and a possible threat on life, one of them used a man as a human shield. They found it to be an easy way to escape. It could also save the life of other police constables. But while they were trying to escape, people started stone pelting and the person who was used as a human shield got badly injured. However, he was saved later by proper treatment.

Answer the following questions:

- Analyse the ethical dilemmas you will face as the SP in both of the above stated situations.
 - Human Rights Activists are demanding action against the officials involved in both the cases. What will be your course of action?
 - The Police Chief of State reaches to you and asks not to take any action, as it would bring down the morale of the police force. What will be your course of action?
 - Can you justify the use of torture in the given circumstances?
 - Would you justify using a human as a shield to save the lives of your colleagues? Give reasons.

a) ETHICAL DILEMMAS

b) Human Rights approach

Merits:

- 3) Human shield was also unjustifiable as other options were present.

Demerits:

- 1) Low morale.
- 2) Senior's orders.

c) Organisational approach

→ Do not take action to defend police men.

Merits:

- Ending the bomb can save

Demerit:

- Poor precedent.

TORTURE

Need to discuss it given only if it's illegal in itself.

→ Often, Indian police find it difficult to solve crimes & criminals rarely confess voluntarily.

→ Yet it is unjustifiable because (2) Possibility of error, (2) Potential for misuse, (3) Allegal in itself (4) Can be overcome using better police evidence gathering, psychological methods etc.

e)

HUMAN SHIELD

→ Though intention is good, as Kant says, no man is to be merely a means for an end - Humans are an end in themselves.

→ In this case, the officers had other options like, using firearms non-lethally, calling backup, etc. International convention clearly prohibits this.
